### Services Provided Last Fiscal Year\*

- ► TC EMS Ordinance in effect
- Two stations in operation
- Staffing level was 2 crews 24/7
- Paramedics on duty every shift
- Good morale
- Good hiring and retention



### Services Provided Last Fiscal Year\*

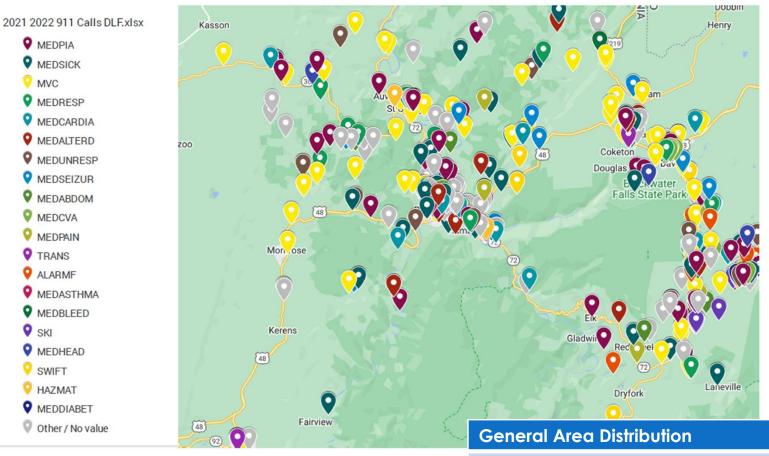
- Number of calls: 1,281 (3.5 calls/day)
- Incidence Codes
  - Medical: 721
  - Personal Injury: 179
  - ► Ski Accident: 19
  - Motor Vehicle Accidents: 131
  - Fires: 31
  - Non-emergency transports: 24
  - ▶ Other: 176

Current Budget assumes 2 stations a large portion of the time, taking into account staffing in June and FY 21/22 expenses.



### Current Service Status

- Services available: 1 station, sometimes a second crew, 1 paramedic 4 days a week
- Staffing at 10 full timers on roster (2 PM, 7 EMT, 1 Driver)
- Response times have increased\*

Month	Low	High	Average
August 2021	2	82	16.5
August 2022	4	123	22.4

- We can't handle all the calls we are presently receiving. Calls handled by EMS teams outside Tucker County (Mutual Aid):
  - Fiscal year 21/22: 21
  - Two months of July -- August 22: 20

# Stable Base Funding: Near Term - Donations Campaign

- Donations are requested to help make up 2022-2023 shortfall
- 22 September: Mailers were sent to all Tucker County mail addresses
- Additional donation request cards were distributed at visitors bureau, banks, Timberline Mountain, other businesses, 5 Rivers Library, Piccolo Paula's
- Asking for levy support from mayors, town councils, business owners
- Funds received so far: \$16,815 as of Oct 14, 2022



### Stable Base Funding: EMS Levy

- Excess levy (For 4 years) Part of your yearly tax bill
- Levy rate is calculated every year based upon the total county assessed values of your home, business, farm, personal and business property. Total amount collected NTE \$401,000
- Appraised value x .60 = Assessed value
- You may be eligible for a homestead exemption that may further reduce your taxable value by an additional \$20,000. (Class II, principal residence, age 65+)



### Stable Base Funding: EMS Levy

Based upon current property book values from the County Assessor:

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Class II - $0.0388 / $100 Assessed value ($0.000388)
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Class III/IV - \$0.0776 / \$100 Assessed value (\$0.000776)

For a Class II home

\$100,000 appraised \$150,000 appraised \$ 60,000 assessed \$ 90,000 assessed \$ 23.28 EMS tax \$ 34.92 EMS tax

# What Will the EMS Levy Cost Me? Example

#### A household with a:

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Primary residence valued at $120,000 (Class II)

Vehicle valued at $20,000 (Class III/IV)
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Appraised Assessed Value

$120,000 \times 0.60 = $72,000

$72,000 \times 0.000388 = $27.94

$20,000 \times 0.60 = $12,000

$12,000 \times 0.000776 = $9.31

Total EMS Levy = $37.25
```



### Get Objective Outside Analysis

- WV EMS Advisory Council (EMSAC)
  - Stabilize current situation 2 station ALS goal
  - Improve internal processes
  - Build community and government shared vision and support for EMS.
  - Work on 5 year strategic objectives across the community



### Get Objective Outside Analysis

- WV Office of EMS (WVOEMS)
  - Emphasis on building community and government shared vision and support for EMS
  - State does not have state level resources to fix this local matter
  - Use WV sponsored training programs to encourage staff development and future EMS certification



### Make Internal Improvements

- ► Accounting: use outside accountant, track financial metrics.
- Exploring improved billing/collection processes
- Apply for and receive grants to improve equipment
- Total review/update of EMS Personnel, Policies and Practices manuals
- Organizational performance metrics and standards
- Data analysis and information sharing
- Plan to add non-emergency transport for increased revenue

### What if Levy Fails?

- Best case: one station operation 24 x7
  - Continued average increase on response times over last year
  - More unanswered calls; continued reliance on outside agencies
  - Likely decrease in positive trauma outcomes



### What if Levy Fails?

- Can degrade the attractiveness of Tucker County and its continued economic development
  - Tourism can be negatively impacted
  - Business development and business diversity unlikely to grow at comparable rate to locations with better health support systems



### What if Levy Succeeds?

- We will be able to attract and retain properly trained professionals
- Hire more staff so that we regain 2 ALS stations 24/7/365
  - Improve average response times
  - Improved individual outcomes likely
- Make Tucker County more desirable for continued growth and prosperity
